## Crime and Punishment

### Key vocabulary



Crime - an unlawful act punishable by a state or other authority.

Punishment - a penalty inflicted as retribution for an offence.

Offence - a breach of a law or rule; an illegal act.

Legal system the framework of rules, procedures, and institutions that a community uses to interpret and enforce their laws.

Justice is the concept that individuals are to be treated in a manner that is equitable and fair.

Judge - Someone who is in charge of a trial in court.

Jury - A group of people who would listen to the facts in a trial and decide if the person is guilty or not guilty

Trial - A judge and jury listen to evidence in a court to decide whether a person is guilty of a crime.

Imprisoned - kept in prison.
