Nouns

A common noun is a word for a general thing, animal, person or place.

book, cat, girl, park

Proper nouns. - Is used for a particular thing which has a special name.

Alice in Wonderland, Laila, Arnold Park.

Collective nouns- used to describe many of the same noun.

Children, books, mice

Adjectives

Adjectives are often called describing words because they are words that describe a noun.



They can be used to describe the colour, size, texture of things.

The car is small.

Or the personality and appearance of people.

The woman is shy and tall.

More adjectives!

Adjectives don't also have to come after the noun. They can also come before.

The funny boy.

You can also use more than one adjective

The funny and young boy.

When using two adjectives together, you can separate them with a comma instead of using the word and.

The funny, young boy.

Conjunctions-



'because' and 'that'.

Sometimes when we use conjunctions one part of the sentence needs to first part to make sense. These are good to add more information to your sentence.

'that' and 'because' are these types of conjunctions.

I am so tired **that** I can't wait to go to bed.

He was late **because** his alarm did not go off.

More conjunctions

Some more example of conjunctions that you can use to give more information to your sentences are 'when' and 'if'.

*You can play with your friend **if** you have tidied your room.*

*I like to read **when** it is time for bed.*
